
Eastern Screech-Owl, Northern Cardinal, White-breasted Nuthatch and Bald Eagle.



6. HANGING SEED CYLINDER FEEDER

Feed your birds any seed or suet cylinder with this attractive hanging cylinder feeder. An included dome top keeps seed and birds protected from the elements. The perch allows non-clinging birds like cardinals to easily access the seed.

7-8. MR. BIRD SEED CYLINDERS

Seed cylinders contain seed, fruit, nuts and/or insects held together by an edible gelatin. They're simple to hang, long-lasting, and less messy than loose seed. Our customers' favorites are *Bugs, Nuts & Fruit*—a fantastic blend of mealworms, pecans, sunflower hearts, raisins, and cranberries, and *Flaming Hot Feast*—sunflower hearts, peanuts, golden safflower, mealworms and hot pepper. The hot pepper deters squirrels and other critters but does not affect birds.

Provide an open water source all winter long and be rewarded with steady visits from a variety of backyard birds. This 60-watt, thermostatically controlled heated birdbath, automatically turns off if the temperature rises above freezing. The heated birdbath insert is 14" in diameter and nests in a clamp-mount black wire ring.

SEASONAL NOTES

Movember: WEEK BY WEEK

Week 1

- ✓ On November 1, 2020 Central Standard Time resumes. Sunset is 5:30pm and moves to 5:00 pm by the end of November.
- ✓ November is a month of big waterfowl migration. Look for Tundra Swans overhead and listen for the muffled musical whistles of the flock. They are migrating to their wintering grounds along the Atlantic Coast.
- ✓ The last flocks of migrating Redwinged Blackbirds, Common **Grackles** and migrating **American** Robins move through. (Many robins and Eastern Bluebirds winter over in MN.)
- ✓ White-throated and Fox Sparrows forage the ground under bird feeding stations.

2nd Week

- ✓ Milkweed pods open and shed dark-brown seeds on white parachutes.
- ✓ Cedar Waxwings visit heated birdbaths and dine on fruit from crabapple trees, junipers and mountain ash trees.
- ✓ Waterfowl migration continues, including huge flocks of Franklin's Gulls on the open water of area lakes.
- ✓ Flocks of Snow Buntings arrive from the Arctic.

Tips: Fill heated birdbaths with cold water to reduce evaporation. Serve **peanuts** to provide birds with fiber, fat and protein that helps them combat cold temps.

3rd Week

- ✓ It's peak mating season for white-tailed Deer.
- ✓ Raccoons enter winter sleeping dens. They don't hibernate; they will forage when temps are about 27°F or higher.
- ✓ Nov. 19 is the average date for permanent snow cover in the Metro.
- ✓ European Starlings are in winter garb of black bills and speckled plumage.

Tips: Serve suet in an upside-down feeder; switch to Golden Safflower and Nyjer seeds to discourage starlings and still feed other birds.

4th Week

- ✓ Northern Flickers may join other woodpeckers at suet feeders during the winter.
- ✓ Flying squirrels do not hibernate and may use bird feeders at night.
- ✓ Opossums have become more frequent backyard visitors but are mostly nocturnal.
- ✓ Crows gather in large flocks to roost together in trees overnight.

Tips: Use a peanut wreath or fly-through feeder to offer in-shell peanuts.

Use a clamp-on-the-deck-rail hanger for easy winter feeding.

December: WEEK BY WEEK

Week 1

- ✓ December 1st is statistically the start of the coldest 90 days of the year.
- ✓ Darkness exceeds 15 hours a day but the daylight hours begins to extend following the winter solstice on Dec 21st.

Tips: Decorate your deck and yard with seed bells for the holidays! Use Flaming Hot seed bells to deter the squirrels.

Prepare to participate in the Audubon Christmas Bird Count: audubon.org/ conservation/science/ christmas-bird-count

2nd Week

✓ Northern MN bird feeders host Pine Grosbeaks. **Red-breasted** Nuthatches visit feeders throughout the state.

Tip: Switch some of vour feeders to outof-the-shell seed like **Medium Sunflower Chips** or **Kracker** Jax. Birds are able to replenish faster and there is no shell mess for you to clean up.



3rd Week

Tips: Toss **Finches**' Choice on the ground under feeding stations to attract Dark-eyed Juncos, Mourning Doves and Northern Cardinals.

Mix suet pellets and dried mealworms into seed to boost the nutrients in your feeders and to help birds survive the cold winter days and nights.

4th Week

- ✓ Each individual **Downy** and **Hairy Woodpecker** roosts at night in separate tree cavities. Downy Woodpeckers may also use a well-insulated birdhouse at night.
- ✓ Wintering robins snack on crabapple tree fruits.
- ✓ Squirrels are active all winter but stay in their leafy nests until midmorning when temperatures climb.
- ✓ Flying squirrels may feed from bird feeders nightly soon after sunset.
- ✓ Bald Eagles fish in open water on the Mississippi and around marinas where the water is kept open on area lakes.

Tips: Use a large Wild Bird Feast seed cylinder in a covered feeder to provide seed while you are out of town. Better yet, call the Wayzata store to set up Feed & Fill service!

Scatter dried mealworms and Berry Nutty where the snow is lightest under pine trees to feed robins and cardinals.
